Members of Discover e.V. are convinced of two things,


1. Many African young people feel that they have no future. Sometimes they suffer poverty or they are persecuted because of their political or religious affiliations. Like successive generations in Europe, they will, of course, continue to migrate to where they think the

opportunities are better.

The aim of Discover is to enable communities in Africa to discover and use their own skills and resources, so that people can build a future at home rather than feeling they have no choice but to leave.

2. A new relationship must be developed between Europe, with its diminishing population, and Africa, with its growing population. With fair trade, ethical and appropriate development aid and a cessation of arms sales, both continents could benefit.

This is the theme of a visionary new book which has just been published. It is by Rudolf Decker and is entitled "Europa und Afrika" – but unfortunately it is only available in German. The question of what we can do to help people



throughout Africa to develop a sense of hope in the future needs urgent consideration.
