Training seminar in Natural Healthcare in Uganda

Rehema Namyalo and two colleagues, Evelyn and Andrew, recently ran a very successful training week in Kaboyo, near Masaka in Uganda. Of 26 participants, 19 were from the locality

and 7 from other parts of Uganda. The report can be read here. A wide range of topics were covered, and participants even benefitted and learnt from the nutritious and predominantly vegetarian meals. We are already getting reports that communities are benefitting from the skills and knowledge that were shared.

Rehema wrote, for example,

"Francis in Arua started by making a charcoal fridge. Next week he will make cough mixture for refugees in West Nile."

"The group in Kaboyo have started implementing the skills gained in the training. They expect me to visit them again soon to monitor their progress."





Rehema's training included identifying, cleaning and planting good banana suckers.

And with her colleague Andrew, "We are planning to establish Vumbula (Discover) Mityana Centre, with a large demonstration garden for training many visitors".

Another similar seminar will take place in March next year. Again, paying guests are welcome. More info here. If we attract 8 paying participants, then all the seminar expenses will be covered, and a local self-help group, that cannot afford to pay, will also benefit.
