## Report from Robert Bwambale in Maliba, Uganda received 3 November 2020

These photographs indicate how water threatens people because we have not protected nature. On 30<sup>th</sup> October last week villages in Maliba sub county were hit by severe floods Over 2000 people have abandoned their homes and land because of land and mud slides. The floods took the lives of four people, two women and two young boys. We have opened eight camps where these homeless people are now settled.
