If we receive enough votes, Discover could receive 3000 Euro from "Engagement Global". This is a section of the overseas development department of the German government that, amongst many other activities, encourages local authorities to be concerned with international issues.

Project EcoFarm of Green4Life in Zimbabwe

Due to the daily need for firewood, trees around Marondera in Zimbabwe have been cut down indiscriminately. The land has become severely degraded, and women must walk far to obtain

the firewood they need. The loss of native tree species means a loss of biodiversity.

Green4Life, a major project of Discover Zimbabwe, aims to transform this situation by developing the EcoFarm. This project is already well under way:

 Seedlings of a variety of indigenous trees are being planted. Trees prevent soil erosion, increase soil fertility, help to prevent flooding, provide shade, and create a good micro-climate. They provide fruit, honey

and raw materials for

medicines. Trees also absorb CO2.

- A demonstration vegetable garden is being established as a training facility in climate smart farming.
- Community members are beginning to cook with biogas. These units use animal and vegetable waste from the smallholdings to produce energy for cooking and lighting.

The community is rapidly developing an awareness of the importance of trees and people are working together to improve their environment and the quality of their lives.
