In Nyara, in northwest Uganda, Discover colleague Christopher Nyakuni has worked hard to bring peace to two clans that, for many years, suffered terrible conflict.

Now, to cement their peace, the clans will plant 800 shea butter trees, and work together to stop others from cutting mature shea butter trees for charcoal.

Trees prevent landslides

Robert Bwambale coordinates a Discover Group with 65

members in Maliba,

under the Rwenzori Mountains in Uganda. In the first half of this year, farmers in Maliba planted over 2000 trees. By practising agroforestry, they can grow fruit and vegetables even during periods of severe drought, and by planting trees on the mountain slopes, they stabilise the soils so that even torrential rains do not result in landslips.

Now Robert will train 100 farmers and community leaders in the wider district in managing the impacts of climate change by planting trees.
