- They have planted trees, thousands of them, the areas have turned green and weather patterns have become rather more stable.
- Farmers have planted trees and practise agroforestry. Their children no longer go to bed hungry!
- Many communities are working together much better. There is less conflict. Women no longer need to walk long distances to return with firewood on their heads.
